



First edition of the technical manual for the DFS Meise glider designed for the 1940 Olympic Games. Text in German and French.

From the British Gliding Association Committee Library with a pencil note inside the front wrapper. Also with the pencil note "A.G Slater from B.S. Shenstone 4.3.39" Alan Slater was the editor of Sailplane & Gilder, the official magazine of The British Gliding Association. In the June 1939 issue he mentions this very manual:

"The "Meile" shown in flight in the adjoining photos, has been chosen as the type to be used by all countries taking part in the qualifying section for the Olympic Games to be held in Finland next year. It is designed by Hans Jacob of the German Research Institute for Soaring flight (D.F.S.), from which, through Mr. B. S. Shenstone. we have received an illustrated description of the machine."

Beverley Shenstone, R. J. Mitchells chief aerodynamicist, is credited with designing the Spitfire's wing. The Spitfire wing shape gave the Spitfire its crucial advantage in the Battle of Britain and beyond. In 1958 he cowrote "The World's Sailplanes". In his later career, he was appointed technical director of BOAC, and promoted human-powered flight.

This manual is presumably one of only a small number distributed to national gliding associations in advance of the 1940 (cancelled) Olympic Games

The manual is in original printed wrappers, stapled as issued with cloth spine. Illustrated with tipped-in photographs and plans.


After the Olympic games in Berlin in 1936 introduced gliding as an Olympic sport, plans were made to fly the 1940 Olympic championships with a standard design of sailplane to give each pilot the same chances. The Meise was redesigned to fit into the new Olympic class specifications. The new 'Olympia' Meise had the prescribed wingspan of 15 m (49 ft 2 in), spoilers, but no flaps, and an undercarriage consisting of a skid and a non-retractable wheel. The pilot sat all-enclosed in an aerodynamically clean fuselage made of laminated wood and topped by an acrylic glass hood. The plane could be launched by winch as well by towplane. Its wood-and-fabric construction made it easy for flying clubs to maintain, to repair and even to build the gliders from kits.

A design contest to select the single Olympic glider was run by testing the prototypes of the entered and accepted designs at Sezze airfield in Italy between 20 and 26 February 1939. There were six evaluation pilots of different nationalities. They chose Hans Jacobs' design, the DFS Meise.

Both the Meise as well as the Olympic class gained immediate enthusiastic support, and the 1940 Olympic gliding championship would probably have ended up as an all-Meise contest — if the Second World War had not intervened and the 1940 Olympics had not been cancelled.


First edition of this very well designed, large-format, publication which provides a detailed insight into the inner workings of a 1930s De Havilland biplane aircraft. With a very stylish art deco cover design, the book is well illustrated with a series of colour plates with hinged flaps that fold back to reveal cut-away views of the fuselage, engine, and other structures. The Shell Corporation produced a number of similar publications during the 1930s, showing the interior details of light aircraft and motor cars.

3. [BADER, Douglas] BRICKHILL Paul Reach for the Sky. The Story of Douglas Bader

Written by Paul Brickhill (already celebrated as the author of another RAF classic 'The Dam Busters', 1951), 'Reach for the Sky' remains the best account of the leg-less Battle of Britain hero. It is the basis of Lewis Gilbert's hugely successful feature film (1954) starring Kenneth More in what was arguably his finest role. One of the legendary figures of the Royal Air Force, Douglas Bader was from the outset an outstanding athlete. As a cadet at Cranwell he gained his 'blues' for cricket, rugby, hockey and boxing. He represented the RAF at both cricket and rugby and would probably have been capped for England but for the accident that changed his life and created a legend. In 1931 a near-fatal air crash left him leg-less. Knowing that no man with such a handicap had ever walked without a stick he nevertheless found his way back to fitness playing tennis, golf and many others sports. He even flew again, until the authorities determined that a pilot without legs could not fly and discharged him from the service. With

the outbreak of War he fought to be readmitted, not merely to a desk job, but back to the cockpit. Finally, he was given command of a flight which quickly increased to five squadrons as the RAF realised that he was not only an outstanding pilot but an inspired leader of men and a fighter tactician almost of genius. Even as a POW of the Germans his spirit was such that his captors were forced at one stage to remove his artificial limbs to prevent the chance of him escaping.


Two typescripts. At the front of both volumes, the author has signed to her close friend Alicia Scott and dated them in the year of publication March 1969. In volume one Bagnold inscribed to Scott "with the author's love, a long pre-publication gift", so presumably the trade UK first edition wasn't published until later in the year.

Her friend Alicia Scott got to read all the salacious details of Bagnold's autobiography first, including her socialising in Chelsea before the great war, her service as a VAD, her friendships with Frank Harris, H.G. Wells and Edward Thomas, and then onto her marriage to Roderick Jones and a lifetime as a writer, including penning her stand out novel *National Velvet*.

A rarity to have Enid Bagnold's working typescript, with her corrections, that was then gifted and inscribed to her close friend, on the front of each volume.

Two A4 sized volumes bound in yellow card both with cloth spines; on the upper panel of each volume the author has typed the title and in the top right hand corner the volume number and the chapters contained within, so volume one covered chapters 1 to 6 and volume to chapters 7 to 15; each page has been typed and where

needed corrected by the author; volume 1 pp [i] 1-161, volume 2 pp [i] 162-334; overall the two volumes are in very good condition, the covers have been crudely laminated most likely by the author, there is a crease to the bottom of volume one, and the occasional foxing mark to the edges, otherwise in decent shape.




In volume 1 of the typescript, there are 19 small corrections where Bagnold has corrected in her pen. She has then gone on to make any additions on her typewriter. There are also some deletions. It can be seen throughout the two volumes that she carefully planned the future insertion of photos and illustrations as well as edit what she had written. She also decided in the end to cut chapter 14 into 2, so the published version ran to 16 chapters rather than the 15 in the typescript.





First edition of a rare title covering the detailed history of the conquerors of India beginning with Mahmud of Ghazni and his bringing Islam to Northern India, all the way up to the growing British hegemony through the East India Company. An extensive number of chapter in-between such as Marco Polo, Baber, Humayun, Shah Jehan, Lord Clive, Mysore and Tippu's fall and many more. A number of further chapters on The Caste System and Religions of the Subcontinent.

"This is a praiseworthy attempt to put into a shape that shall be suitable and attractive to the young some of the most striking episodes in the history of our great Eastern possession. It is written in a simple, un- affected, and almost childlike strain, that almost disarms criticism." (The Spectator Review 21 October 1876)

Joseph Benwell was an English artist, engraver and illustrator. He was primarily an artist in the 'orientalist' style. Many of his paintings and engravings were based on his travels in the Near and Middle East, China and India, often featuring camel

caravans, Arab scenes and depictions of Indian life.

Benwell was a prolific illustrator for various Victorian religious publications, particularly those published by the *Religious Tract Society* and with a missionary theme, for example *The Sunday at Home: A Family Magazine for Sabbath Reading, The Leisure Hour, a Family Journal of Instruction* and *Recreation and The Picture Scrap Book* series (the latter aimed at Victorian youth) during the 1850s through to the mid-1860s. His entry in the *Modern English Biography* states that he 'executed thousands of wood blocks for the Religious Tract Society to about 1876, and in Missionary publications; illustrated *The Illustrated London News* and *Sunday at Home* for many years'. The 1862 edition of *Sunday at Home* refers to 'an interesting series of 'Indian Illustrations of Scripture', delivered in the form of a lecture by the Rev W M Robertson BA of London, with the aid of 'dissolving views' painted by Mr Benwell, formerly of Calcutta, many of whose Indian scenes have already appeared in *The Sunday at Home*'. Joseph Austin Benwell also provided illustrations for other Victorian periodicals, although not necessarily with a religious theme, including the literary *Cornhill Magazine* and *The Welcome Guest: a Magazine of Recreative Reading for All*. He produced illustrations on Indian and Eastern life for *The Illustrated London News* between 1857 and 1864.


An important and pleasing association copy. Cyril Maude was the joint owner of the Haymarket Theatre where Barrie's stage adaptation of his story *The Little Minister* was premiered in November 1897, with Cyril Maude in the leading role of Gavin Dishart. The show ran for 320 performances. The play was well-received and

established the theatre as a significant venue, particularly for plays offering an alternative to pantomimes and special effects. The play's success and the Haymarket's reputation contributed to the theatre's ongoing legacy as a premier venue.



A collection of 7 modern-day fables.

Mary Bartlett, celebrated horticulturist and bookbinder, worked at Dartington Hall firstly in the gardens and then at the Hall's bindery under Eric McNally. "I joined his classes in 1974 and gradually developed my skills. When Mr McNally died in 1986, I said I'd keep it going. Almost 40 years later I'm still in charge of the workshop. I'm proud of the fact that over the 90 years of the bookbindery's life I'm one of only three people to have run it." (From an interview with Mary Bartlett by Peter Marsh at the Dartington centenary celebration in July 2025)

"It is noticeable in the story of the Dartington Bindery that there might at one time or another have been a small fine art press on the Estate to match *Gregynog, The Golden Cockerell, Circle or Coracle* or any of the dwindling company of modern equivalents. But the preference was generally for something simpler more practical and more affordable, in the service of the bigger social and educational experiment. Mc [Eric McNally] was an underachiever in that respect; but he had the gleam of the master craftsman in one eye and of the Socialist in the other" (*Inky Rags. Letterpress Printing & Bookbinding on the Dartington Hall Estate 1935-2010* by Mary Bartlett)



One of the great Works of exploration on Tibet. Bonvalot was one of the earliest Europeans to visit Tibet. Starting in the very south of Russian Turkestan in the summer of 1889, Bonvalot only reached the very end of his journey in the September of 1890. Before the British expedition to Lhasa in 1904 Tibet was essentially closed to Europeans. Bonvalot was detained during his passage through Tibet and was only allowed to continue after extensive negotiations.




The 44 celebrated love poems which Elizabeth Browning wrote for her husband Robert, composed in 1845-6. After the first edition of her "Poems" was published in 1844, Robert Browning wrote in admiration to Elizabeth and their subsequent courtship inspired these sonnets, which he insisted she include in this Second Edition of her collected verse.

Wise states in his bibliography 'the Second, but greatly enlarged, Edition of Mrs Browning's 'Poems' is of considerable interest and importance, and its claim to rank as a princeps is fully justified'. Thomas J. Wise; A Bibliography of the Writings in Prose and Verse of Elizabeth

Georges-Louis Leclerc, Comte de Buffon (1707-1788) was a French mathematician who was considered one of the leading naturalists of the Enlightenment. An acquaintance of Voltaire and other intellectuals, he worked as Keeper at the Jardin du Roi from 1739, and this inspired him to research and publish a vast encyclopaedia and survey of natural history, the ground-breaking Histoire Naturelle, which he published in forty-four volumes between 1749 and 1804.

The Natural History of Birds, first published between 1770 and 1783 and translated into English in 1793, contain Buffon's survey and descriptions of birds from the Histoire Naturelle. Based on recorded observations of birds both in France and in other countries, these volumes provide detailed descriptions of various bird species, their habitats and behaviours, and were the first publications to present a comprehensive account of eighteenth-century ornithology.

William Smellie (1740–1795) was a Scottish printer who edited the first edition of the *Encyclopædia Britannica*. He was also a naturalist and antiquary. He was a joint founder of the Royal Society of Edinburgh, co-founder of the Society of Antiquaries of Scotland, and a friend of Robert Burns.




The basis for the 1971 movie of the same name directed by Stanley Kubrick with Malcolm McDowell, Patrick Magee, Michael Bates and Warren Clarke. The author thought the film was a masterpiece but resented having to defend the film on television and in print as it was not his own work. Burgess gave the movie a positive review for the *Listener* after the film went on general release in January 1972: "technically brilliant, thoughtful, relevant, poetic, mind-opening. It was possible for me to see the work as a radical remaking of my own novel, not as a mere interpretation, and this the feeling that it was no impertinence to blazon it as *Stanley Kubrick's Clockwork Orange* is the best tribute I can pay to the Kubrickian mastery"



18. CHURCHILL, Sir Winston Winged Words. [Excerpts from Speeches May 1940 - February 1941]

Liverpool Published by John Peck & Company Limited [1941]

First edition of this collection of extracts from speeches. An unrecorded pamphlet not known to the Churchill bibliographers, Woods or Cohen. Unrecorded at institutions.

An 8 page wartime pamphlet featuring excerpts from Prime Minister Winston Churchill's speeches, spanning the first ten months of his premiership, from May 1940 to February 1941. The majority from the period of The Battle of Britain.

The front cover features a photographic portrait of Churchill framed by a double red rule above the title "Winged Words" printed above a red double horizontal rule. Seven pages within feature eleven excerpts from Churchill's speeches of May, June, July, August, September, October, and November 1940, as well as three excerpts from Churchill's speeches of February 1941. Each excerpt is dated by month and titled as follows:



The rear cover is printed "Presented with the Compliments of John Peck & Company Limited" (a Liverpool clothing manufacturer) above an illustrated advertisement for "Pexwear" overalls, billed as "The uniform of Britain's war workers". At the foot of the page is a five-line advertisement for *Into Battle*, the first volume of Churchill s war speeches published by Cassell and Company on 6 February 1941.


A remarkable rarity with no other copy known.

The publication of this pamphlet by a Liverpool manufacturer of protective work clothing and uniforms may seem incongruous and it is possibly a pirated and unauthorised pamphlet. Notwithstanding it should be remembered that Churchill himself was a devotee of the "Siren Suit", albeit his boiler suits were made by Jermyn Street tailors Turnbull & Asser.



First edition. A profusely extra-illustrated copy, with remarkable provenance and many manuscript letters of Clarke and M'Arthur's seminal biography of Nelson.

Quarto. In two volumes. vii, 15, [1], xlv, [1], 375, [1]; [2], 511pp, [1]. With an engraved portrait frontispiece to each volume, 10 further engraved plates, and four engraved vignettes. Extra-illustrated with 21 engraved plates, nine manuscript documents, two facsimile letters, [2]pp description of Naples, three leaves of The Times newspaper, and a broadside variously bound, tipped-in, or loosely inserted. Recent half calf, tooled in gilt and blind, marbled boards, contrasting red and green morocco lettering-pieces, all edges gilt. Minor shelf-wear, a little staining to spine of vol.2 Marbled endpapers, a little scattered foxing, short closed tear to margin of leaf 5M2, some waterstaining to margins of plates in vol. 2.

From the library of British army officer Edward Charles Fletcher with his bookplate, thence from the library of Nelson author and authority C.J. Britton, to Norfolk-based amateur historian, and inaugural member of the Nelson Society, R. C. Fiske with his bookplate.

Fiske notes on the recto of front blank fly-leaf of Vol. I: 'This fine copy comes from the library of C. J. Britton, the Nelson author and authority. It comprises a good copy formerly belonging to Edward Charles Fletcher (see his book-plate) and some leaves salvaged from a poor copy formerly belonging to Nelson's old 'Sea-Daddy', Capt. Wm. Locker. These leaves had brief annotations by Locker and were kept in the original full calf covered boards (no spine) which had Locker's gilt stamps on the front. When it became necessary to re-case Fletcher's volumes I had Locker's duplicate pages inserted and adding his gilt stamps in the form of a book-plate. The extra illustrations and letters which Britton had inserted have been retained. The loose ones have been collected and inserted by myself. RCF'.

Fiske is mistaken in believing that the duplicate leaves were from William Locker's copy (he had died in 1800). Rather they were from his son, Edward Hawke Locker's copy (see List of Orders Vol.1 p.9). A short note by C.J. Britton attests to this.

There are 2 duplicate leaves in volume 1 (pp. 15 and 303) and 6 duplicate leaves in volume 2 (pp. 55, 79, 83, 85, 257 and 453).

Also taken from the Locker copy and tipped into volume 1 is a contemporary (watermarked 1794) manuscript copy of the "A Few Remarks Relative to Myself in the Captain, in which my Pendant was Flying on the Most Glorious Valentine's Day, 1797". This original manuscript is noted in a letter from Nelson to Locker of Feb 21st

1797. The "Remarks" are reproduced on pp. 349-351 of Volume 1. Together with two sheets from Nelson's journal (apparently in the handwriting of a clerk)



The extra manuscript documents contained within this copy include:

- James Stanier Clarke (1766-1834), an A.L.S. circa 1809, three pages mounted on card 'I have got another name for the Nelson Life that has been omitted, like many others. The fault does not rest with me. And I send you the letter I have received. More than twenty years afterwards (1799) Nelson wrote to Locker: 'I have been your scholar; it is you who taught me to board a Frenchman by your conduct when in the Experiment; it is you who always told me 'Lay a Frenchman close and you will beat him;' and my only merit in my profession is being a good scholar. Our friendship will never end but with my life, but you have always been too partial to me'.

In the course of the journeys he visited areas and communities as isolated as Gough Island, Tristan da Cunha and South Georgia, and in places like these, and on the long sea passages between them, he was able to photograph many of the birds which are particular to such areas. The pictures are of great appeal and interest and include many of birds which are seldom photographed."

An appealing presentation copy. Corley Smith was a career diplomat. His final posting was as ambassador to Ecuador, where he found many opportunities for ornithology in a country with a wide variety of climates from tropical Amazonia to the high Andes. In Ecuador, Corley Smith's expertise on high altitude humming-birds found on the Cotopaxi led him to become friends with Professor Jean Dorst, a French ornithologist who was also president of the newly formed Charles Darwin Foundation (CDF) for the Galápagos Islands, which Corley Smith went to visit. He visited the islands again in 1964 on the Royal Yacht Britannia with the Duke of Edinburgh, who later became patron of the foundation. This copy of the Duke's books was presented to him on that visit.

Corley Smith went on to establish a national park to protect the Galápagos environment under Ecuadorean control, and organised a British-financed study to recommend how the needs of conservation should be reconciled with the development of tourism to help the economy of the islands. Corley Smith left Ecuador in 1967, and the following year the new National Park Service of Ecuador came into existence. The newly retired ambassador was lured to join the CDF's executive council.







This third issue of the Gennadius Library's magazine *The New Griffon* is dedicated in toto to George Katsimbalis. In addition to Fermor's contribution there are, inter alia, articles on the correspondence between George Sefaris and George Katsimbalis, a poem by Scottish poet Brian Johnstone, and an essay on Edward Lear "The landscape painter of Greece". The essays are printed in Greek, English with some also in French.

The Gennadius Library opened in 1926 with the 26,000 volume collection of diplomat and bibliophile Joannes Gennadius. The Library houses today 145,000 titles of rare books and bindings, research materials, manuscripts, archives, and works of art that illuminate Hellenism, Greece, and neighboring civilizations from antiquity to modern times. Rare maps of the Mediterranean, early editions of Homer's Iliad and Odyssey and a laurel wreath belonging to Lord Byron are just some of the unique items to be found here. The library also has the original manuscript of this essay by Fermor.





Gill did not pass through the typical art school course of training, and so did not regard 'life' drawing as an essential foundation. He came to it, in middle age, as an activity to be enjoyed for its own sake. Further, he did not care for professional models, and preferred friends to pose for him. The model for some of these studies was Beatrice Warde, the typographer and associate of the Monotype Corporation. In their total reliance on white line, these engravings are extraordinary achievements. As Robert Speaight has written, the contours look as if they could 'burst into flame'.

Christopher Skelton in *The Engravings of Eric Gill*, 1983 regarding the printed title page and wrapper for Gill's 25 *Nudes*: "The page was originally printed from line blocks reduced from prints of P968-71" He adds that Ralph Beedham, Gill's one time assistant, helped Gill with the blocks. Gill's relationship with the blocks is strong both as artist and printer as the title page was printed at his press in High Wycombe and the book was Gill's own production.

Herman Radin was a New York doctor, print collector and writer on medical bookplates. He commissioned numerous artists to make bookplates for himself and gave his collection of over 300 bookplates to New York Public Library, which had an exhibition of them in 1943. 'An exhibition of bookplates', Bulletin of the New York Public Library, XLVII, 12, December 1943, pp.863-66.



This book was published when Eric Gilll was in his artistic prime. In 1924, the Gill family left Ditchling and moved to an isolated, disused monastery at Capel-y-ffin in the Black Mountains of Wales. The isolation of Capel-y-ffin suited Gill's wish to distance himself from what he regarded as an increasingly secular and industrialised society, and his time there proved to be among the most productive of his artistic career. At Capel, Gill made the sculptures The Sleeping Christ (1925), Deposition (1925), and Mankind (1927). He created engravings for a series of books published by the Golden Cockerel Press considered among the finest of their kind, and it was at Capel that he designed the typefaces Perpetua, Gill Sans, and Solus.





Golding was keen to preserve similar themes of savagery and the breakdown of civilisation, with the plot this time focusing on a band of Neanderthals, and their interactions with (and fascination by) a group of early humans who have mastered the skills of fire-making, ship-building, and weaponry.

Golding himself considered the novel to be his finest, and it remained his firm favourite throughout his life.

LZ 127 Graf Zeppelin (Deutsches Luftschiff Zeppelin 127) was a German passenger-carrying hydrogen-filled rigid airship that flew from 1928 to 1937. It offered the first commercial transatlantic passenger flight service. The ship was named after the German airship pioneer Ferdinand von Zeppelin, a count (Graf) in the German nobility. It was conceived and operated by Hugo Eckener, the chairman of Luftschiffbau Zeppelin.

Graf Zeppelin made 590 flights totalling almost 1.7 million kilometres (over 1 million miles). It was operated by a crew of 36 and could carry 24 passengers. It was the longest and largest airship in the world when it was built. It made the first circumnavigation of the world by airship, and the first nonstop crossing of the Pacific Ocean by air; its range was enhanced by its use of Blau gas as a fuel. It was built using funds raised by public subscription and from the German government, and its operating costs were


offset by the sale of special postage stamps to collectors, the support of the newspaper magnate William Randolph Hearst, and cargo and passenger receipts.

After several long flights between 1928 and 1932, including one to the Arctic, Graf Zeppelin provided a commercial passenger and mail service between Germany and Brazil for five years. When the Nazi Party came to power, they used Graf Zeppelin as a propaganda tool. The airship was withdrawn from service after the Hindenburg disaster in 1937 and scrapped for military aircraft production in April 1940.

"The joy and self-confidence in so much of Grahame's text, ensured the book's place as a children's classic" (Grolier) "one of the central classics of children's fiction" (Oxford Companion to Children's Literature).

Grahame's tales of the riverbank started life as bedtime stories that he read to his son. *The Wind in the Willows*, is however a far more interesting book than its popular and often juvenile audience might suggest. First, it is the work of a writer who had known considerable success in the 1890s as a young contemporary of Oscar Wilde and also an admired contributor to the literary quarterly *The Yellow Book*. At that point, Grahame was employed by the Bank of England but, still in his 20s, was publishing stories in literary magazines, work that became collected in *Dream Days* (1895) and an even more successful publication, *The Golden Age* (1898). The text of *The Wind in the Willows* also encrypts a family tragedy. In 1899, Grahame married and had one child, a boy named Alastair who was troubled with health problems and a difficult personality, culminating in the boy's eventual suicide, the cause of much parental anguish. When Grahame finally retired from the Bank of England (as Secretary) in 1908, he could concentrate on the stories he had been telling his son, the stories of the Thames riverbank on which Grahame himself had grown up. "(Robert McCrum).

C.S. Lewis and his fellow inkling J.R.R. Tolkien were both devotees of *The Wind in the Willows*. Tolkien writing appreciatively about "this excellent book" in his essay on fairy-stories.



Greenwood's *Atlas of the Counties of England and Wales* was published in parts between 1829 and 1834. 'It was an astonishing achievement for a private surveyor in so short a time. The majority of these surveys anticipated publication of the sheets of the Ordnance Survey. Even in the south of England and in Lincolnshire, where the Ordnance Survey published their maps first, Greenwood did not slavishly copy the work, but offered a distinctive style and some additional information; not least of the attractions of his maps was the high standard of the engraving... The enduring popularity of its plates came partly from the beautifully engraved vignettes of cathedrals, castles, or town views that graced each one' (ODNB).

The maps and vignettes provide a geographical and architectural overview of England and Wales as the countries transitioned from the Georgian era into the forthcoming Victorian age.

Many of the vignettes were drawn by Roger Creighton. Creighton was born in Tynemouth, the son of David Creighton and his wife Catherine Lawson. He is first recorded as a land-surveyor in Wakefield, and perhaps trained under Christopher Greenwood, with whom he worked on the county maps from 1818 and whom he evidently followed to London. He married Martha Gostling 16 Jan 1823 at St. George, Hanover Square. He was recorded variously as a surveyor or draughtsman on the baptismal records of their children between 1824 and 1834. After the collapse of the Greenwood county project, he became the principal draughtsman for the "Topographical dictionary" series published by Samuel Lewis.

It does not seem that the vignettes that grace the maps were reproduced in any other publication, and as such Greenwood's *Atlas* provides a singular collection of late Georgian architectural views.

The Greenwood brothers were land-surveyors from Yorkshire who compiled one of the last independent large-scale county atlases, in the face of competition from the Ordnance Survey. The maps are both decorative and detailed but, as Worms reveals in 'British Map Engravers' the project was not a financial success: in 1834 Christopher was imprisoned for debt and the engraved plates soon passed to other hands

Four of the wood engraved vignettes are titled in pencil by the artist: 'Envoy' (a bird carrying a book in its beak), 'Foreign Children' (an Inuit fishing) and 'The Flowers' (two small figures passing huge flowers) and 'My treasures' (soldiers, a chisel, and a flute in a nest), the other two are of a small pine bough and 'The End' with a boy playing with his toys.

All of the vignettes are inscribed in pencil by Joan Hassall to Sydney C Cockerell using their initials and are variously dated 23.3.49, 19.6.49 and 22.6.49.

Hassall had a benefactor in Sir Sydney Cockerell, the director of the Fitzwilliam Museum from 1908 to 1937. They had met in 1948, a year before she inscribed these proof engravings to him. Joan Hassall became one of the group of women who helped care for him in Kew in his old age, a group he called "Angels". He financed her trips to Europe and gave her two valuable Holbein books which she used as security to raise a loan to repair her house in Kensington Park Road. She often sent proofs to him inscribed SCC and on his death in 1962 they were returned to her and many of them are now in the Fitzwilliam Museum.

Joan Hassall was also notable for being the first woman Master of the Art-Worker's Guild in 1972 which had stayed closed to women until 1964.





The Women's Press, an independent publishing house established in 1907, was an integral component of the Women's Social and Political Union campaign, ensuring a public platform for feminist literature and arguments for women's suffrage. Laurence Housman was a pacifist, human rights activist and supporter of the suffrage movement who helped found the Men's League for Women's Suffrage in England in 1907. His adaptation of the classic Aristophanes comedy, which focuses on the political activism of women (effecting a truce in the Peloponnesian war by refusing to sleep with their husbands), was first performed in October 1910 to open Gertrude Kingston's Little Theatre, with Kingston in the title role. This copy includes the advertisement for Votes for Women and a list of other titles by the Press.




A career airman Philip Joubert de la Ferte joined the Royal Flying Corps in 1913. With the outbreak of the First World War in 1914, he joined the British Expeditionary Force flying one of the first two operational sorties of the war. At the start of the Second World War, Joubert was Air Officer Commanding Air Forces in India. On his return to Great Britain he occupied a number of senior staff appointments and as assistant chief of air staff he had special responsibility for the practical application of radar in the RAF. Much of the success of the radar was due to his realisation early on of its enormous value, for defence and attack.

Joubert was also employed by the BBC to give war update broadcasts both to a home audience but also to America and more interestingly to Germany. The broadcasts give an overview of the war as a whole throughout the period of the Battle of Britain. Not only confined to events within Britain it provides an intriguing account of

the war as whole, and although Joubert speaks on behalf of all the armed services, there is, not surprisingly, an aviator's twist on the situations described.

This collection comprises c.28 individual scripts for radio broadcasts, some with manuscript corrections, some duplicated texts. Some creasing and a few pages with a little loss. Housed in a tattered folder with the ink title "Broadcasts by Air Marshal Sir Philip B Joubert"

At the rear there is a small selection of correspondence and a script for a broadcast made in July 1941 to be aired to German soldiers.

The typescript for an unpublished book version of the broadcasts comprising 2 page preface + pp1-106 + 2 page epilogue, with unnumbered chapter preces before each chapter. Loose leaves, the preces on smaller sheets of paper with punch holes to top left corner. A few dog-earred pages and a few manuscript corrections by the author.

That the manuscript was not eventually published is not a surprise. In the Preface the author himself states: "When it was first suggested to me that the general public might be interested in a volume containing the broadcasts I made in 1940, I was doubtful as to the wisdom of producing such a book. A broadcast is a personal thing - it is written in a manner which is not very suitable to a book, and it 'get's over' or not very much on the speaker's voice and the way he phrases or emphasizes his material."

"I have collected material not only from the talks given on the Home Service programme but also those put out on the Overseas Service, so some of them may be new to British listeners. My excuse for doing so is that the overseas talks fill in certain gaps in the general story, and make a more complete picture of 'War Commentary' from May 1940 until January 1941."

A record of the scripts is recorded in the National Archive but they were never published.







To complete the fiction of archaeological work,

Woolley and Lawrence wrote *The Wilderness of Zin*, the first of Lawrence's works to appear in book form" (O'Brien 6).

Their stated assignment was "to trace ancient caravan routes, identify Biblical sites, and generally find out what they could about the historical development of a hitherto seldom explored region" (James, Golden Warrior, 76). Lawrence, however, would write that Kitchener "insisted on the Palestine Exploration Fund's bringing out its record of our archaeological researching, p.d.q. as a whitewash" (O'Brien, 6).





An anthology of Islamic verse by the nineteenth century British convert from Christianity to Islam, William Henry Quilliam (1856-1932), who changed his name to Abdullah Quilliam and later Henri Marcel Leon or Haroun Mustapha Leon, noted for founding England's first mosque and Islamic centre, and Britain's oldest Muslim organisation, the Association of British Muslims.

Born in Liverpool to a wealthy Manx family, Quilliam was brought up a Methodist and later became a successful solicitor. In 1887, after a visit to Morocco, he converted to Islam and, with the financial help of Nasrullah Khan, Crown Prince of Afghanistan, subsequently established the Liverpool Muslim Institute, the first functioning mosque in Britain (1889). A key figure in the promotion of Islam in Britain, he supported the establishment of educational institutions, wrote works explaining the principles of Islam, and established British Muslim periodicals. He travelled extensively and received many honours from the leaders of the Islamic world. Abdul Hamid II, the 26th Ottoman Caliph, granted Quilliam the title of Shaykh al - Islām for the British Isles. The Emir of Afghanistan recognised him as the Sheikh of Muslims in Britain, and he was appointed as Persian Vice Consul in Liverpool by the Shah.

Although attributed to an early Turkish poet, the present work is often considered to be the work of Quilliam himself.

A fascinating Isle of Man cookery book, sponsored and paid for by Thomas Crellin of Oakland Califonia. Crellin was secretary of the Morgan oyster company and prominent in San Francisco and Oakland business circles. He was shot by a revolver owned by E. M. McMillan, deputy and fish commissioner in 1909 when the Fish Commissioner's pistol exploded. The Crellin family had moved from the Isle of Man to Oakland.

Sophia Morrison, the editor, whose mother was Louise Crellin, was a Manx cultural activist, folklore collector and author. Through her own work and role in encouraging and enthusing others, she is considered to be one of the key figures of the Manx cultural revival. She is best remembered today for writing *Manx Fairy Tales*,

published in 1911, although her greatest influence was as an activist for the revitalisation of Manx culture, particularly through her work with the Manx Language Society and its journal, *Mannin*, which she edited from 1913 until her death.





Born in London in 1919, Eric Newby was educated at St Paul's School. He began his travelling career in a perambulator commuting between Hammersmith Bridge and such seaside resorts as Frinton. In 1938 he persuaded his father to have him apprenticed to the four-masted Finnish barque Moshulu and, with camera in tow, sailed in the last Grain Race from Australia to Europe by way of Cape Horn – the beginning of a lifelong passion for both travel and photography.

During the war Newby served in the Black Watch and the Special Boat Service and was awarded the Military Cross. It was as a prisoner of war in Italy that he first met Wanda, his beloved wife and travelling companion of many years. The Satanic Verses was Rushdie's fourth novel, and caused huge controversy when it was initially released due to its depiction of the prophet Muhammad. The title refers to the satanic verses, a group of Quranic verses that refer to three Pagan Meccan goddesses: Allāt, Uzza, and Manāt. The novel employs elements of magic realism interspersed with a sequence of subplots that take the form of intricate dream narratvies relayed by the protagonist. American theorist Timothy Brennan would later praise The Satanic Verses as, "the most ambitious novel yet published to deal with the immigrant experience in Britain".

The scandal that ensued surrounding creative censorship was extremely divisive. A year after publication Ruhollah Khomeini, Supreme Leader of Iran, issued a fatwa ordering Muslims to kill Rushdie for blaspheming against Islam. A fatwa cannot be revoked in the Shia Islamic tradition. Pakistan banned the book in 1988 and the importing of the book was forbidden in India. Many translators of The Satanic Verses have suffered serious injury and, in the case of Rushdie's Japanese translator, death. In fact, in 2022, Rushie was himself attacked on


stage whilst talking at an event. Subsequent to this stabbing, he lost sight in one eye and the ability to use one hand. Remarking on the extreme controversy surrounding The Satantic Verses, scholar M.D. Fletcher considered the irony, "that some of the major expressions of hostility toward Rushdie came from those about whom and (in some sense) for whom he wrote."

Speaking of his own work, Rushdie has defined his intentions as being, not about Islam at all, but rather a novel concerned with issues as varied as; "migration, metamorphosis, divided selves, love, death, London and Bombay". The complex controversy surrounding The Satanic Verses continues to impact. It is an influential novel which explores, amongst many other subjects, the disillusionment suffered by chaarcters in between identification with competing cultures. It is a novel which, through unusual surreal depiction, highlights identity crises whilst binding its text in powerful parallel stories with roots in diverse religious history.

Kim Philby was the probably most notorious and successful spy in history, a British intelligence officer and member of the Cambridge spy ring who had been recruited by the Russians whilst at university. Revealed as "the third man", Philby had been operating for the Russians as a double agent since before the war, and in 1963 he defected to Russia where he lived out his life until his death in 1988, aged 76.

Philby had inherited his interest in the Arabs from his father, the great Arabist and explorer Harry St John Philby (1885-1960), and worked as a journalist in various Arab countries, supporting the Arab cause. His father is mentioned in the book:

"One of the finest sporting achievements during the war in the Near East was accomplished by a British civilian official, a Mr H. St. John Philby, who played no part in the Hedjaz campaign, but who startled King Hussain one day by turning up in Bedouin costume at his summer capital of Taif. Philby had been sent on a secret mission to the court of Ibn Saud in the very heart of Central Arabia, and had accomplished the remarkable feat of trekking right across Arabia from the Persian Gulf to the Red Sea though a totally unknown region. Lawrence was so impressed with Philby's achievement and his skill in dealing with the Bedouins, that after the war he was instrumental in having Philby appointed advioser to the sultan of Transjordania." (pp.317-318)

Books from Kim Philby's library are rare. He left his books and papers on defection, and in 1993 his Russian fourth wife Rufina offered them to the British Library for £68,000. However, the government was horrified that the family of a notorious spy should benefit financially, and the sale was prevented. The material was eventually sold at Sotheby's for £150,000. It is not known if this volume was included in that sale. Philby lived as a Russian in Moscow and ordered books from a Cambridge bookshop. He was, unsurprisingly, keen on John le Carre and Graham Greene, the latter with whom he corresponded.

Lowell Jackson Thomas (April 6, 1892 – August 29, 1981) was an American writer, broadcaster, and documentary filmmaker, known as a world traveller. He authored more than fifty non-fiction books, mostly travel narratives and popular biographies of explorers and military men. Between 1930 and the mid-1970s, Thomas appeared regularly on radio and occasionally on television as a travel and news commentator. Until the 1950s, he was a narrator of Movietone newsreels shown in cinemas.

Thomas was especially known for the writings and documentary films that turned T. E. Lawrence (Lawrence of Arabia) into an international celebrity.


T.E. Lawrence, often described as an intelligence officer, who worked with Arab forces during the Arab Revolt in World War I, serving as a liaison and advisor to the Arab leaders against the Ottoman Empire, was considered by many to be a British spy.

Before WWI His work in the Middle East under the guise of archaeological research provided the British Government with up-to-date maps of the area. His role during WW1, involved gathering intelligence,

coordinating guerrilla movements, and promoting the cause of an independent Arab state, making him a legendary and controversial figure in British history. An appealing association copy of a book which enhanced the legend of Lawrence of Arabia.

It is arranged chronologically and there is an excellent index at end.

"Richard Weston (1733-1806) appears to have had an excellent knowledge of nursery gardening and nurserymen's sale catalogues. He was interested in agriculture and all forms of horticulture, and he also made a study of horticultural and botanical literature. Weston's first important published work

appeared in 1769 anonymously. This was his *Tracts on practical agriculture and gardening*. At the end of this volume, and in subsequent editions of the work, is a very useful *'Catalogue of English authors on husbandry, gardening, botany, and subjects relative thereto'.*"

"Bookbinding began as a hobby for Anthony Gardner (1887-1973), but following his retirement as a Chief Structural Engineer in the Ministry of Works in 1953 he established his own bookbinding and restoration firm. Gardner was also a self-taught engraver and calligrapher". (Bodleian Library)


Gardner made a point of adding an "Apologia" to his bindings explaining the work that he had executed. He also numbered his bindings, this being No. 1016, executed c. 1973. Gardner's archives are held at the Bodleian Library. For more on Gardner see Dorothy Harrap's essay in Book Collector Magazine Summer 1973 written shortly before he executed this binding.

Amongst the various subjects covered are hints for raising mulberry trees for the feeding of silkworms, growing cauliflowers under glass, growing aromatic herbs, roses and flowers, and raising peas, asparagus, melons and mushrooms in pits, improvements in Cider, Perry and Wines, methods of fattening fowls, geese, ducks and turkeys etc etc.



The account of his journey beginning in southern China in 1871, with descriptions of the major Chinese cities and people as he travelled to Peking. China, at the time was still in disarray from the Taiping Rebellion, and the country did not impress Whyte. The detail given to his trek across Mongolia is perhaps the most fascinating portion of the book as Outer Mongolia was scarcely visited during the mid 19th century and contemporary accounts are sought after. The second portion of the title details his journey across Siberia and towards Russia proper. His journey took place during the period when many hundreds of thousands of Eastern Slavs were settling across Siberia every year, all the way to the Pacific. As such he is able to provide descriptions of new cities that previously had not existed, or at best were trading posts.


