A scarce Bawden item, the wrapper charmingly depicting the "inspired cockroach".

Archy and Mehitabel are the names of two fictional characters created in 1916, by Don Marquis, a columnist for The Evening Sun newspaper in New York City. Archy, a cockroach, and Mehitabel, an alley cat, appeared in hundreds of humorous verses and short stories in Marquis' daily column, "The Sun Dial". Their exploits were first collected in the 1927 book *Archy and Mehitabel*, and in two later volumes, *Archy's life of Mehitabel* (1933) and *Archy does his part* (1935).




In January 1909, Bell left England for Mesopotamia. She visited the Hittite city of Carchemish, photographed the relief carvings in Halamata Cave, mapped and described the ruin of Ukhaidir, and travelled on to Babylon and Najaf. In Carchemish, she consulted with the two archaeologists on site, T. E. Lawrence and Reginald Campbell Thompson. She struck up a friendship with Lawrence, and the two would trade letters in the following years. Both Bell and Lawrence had attended Oxford and earned a First Class Honours in Modern History, both spoke fluent Arabic, and both travelled extensively in the Arabian desert and established ties with the local tribes.

This copy of Grimm's Fairy tales was bought in Cairo in the 1950s and so it would appear that Bell had it with her when travelling in the Middle East and when in communication in person with Lawrence.







Centred heavily on the figure, Pocock's work reveals a realistic treatment, despite the exaggerated emotions and expression, small touches of pattern and colour also pull in the viewer's attention. The simple settings of Pocock's illustrations are enhanced by a canny use of lighting to add dimension in darkly wooded areas."





Inspector Spectre goes undercover to investigate numerous reported strange events during the meetings of the Oxford Phantasmalogical Society, where an actress prophesies under the influence of ethene gas escaping into the basement of the building. Charles Dodgson also makes a first time appearance at the Society meeting, which gets out of hand as too much ethene escapes and every-one begins to pro-phesy nonsense which becomes

the inspiration for some of the famous poems in Carroll's "Sylvie and Bruno" books.

This special issue has an original leaf from the true first edition of Lewis Carroll's Alice's Adventures in Wonderland tipped in at the rear and in addition an extra essay by John Windle on the history of leaf books, and an essay by Bennett on Dutch paper bindings.

The Alice leaf in this copy is p. 95, the opening page of Chapter VII A Mad Tea-Party. Originally prepared for the Macmillan first edition of Alice, these sheets were rejected by Lewis Carroll and John Tenniel with the entire edition suppressed. The unused sheets from England were sent to D. Appleton & Company in New York to be used for the first American edition of 1866. Thus this leaf from the Appleton issue represents the earliest printing of Alice's Adventures in Wonderland.

This exhibition presents 100 famous children's books, printed in the last 400 years, from 1600 to 2000. Some of the beloved books on display in the exhibition are Robinson Crusoe, Grimm's Fairy Tales, Alice's Adventures in Wonderland, Tom Sawyer, Treasure Island, Peter Rabbit, The Wizard of Oz, Peter Pan, Winnie-the-Pooh, Charlotte's Web, The Cat in the Hat, Where the Wild Things Are, and Harry Potter. These classics and others ~ many famous today, some only in their time ~ will bring smiles of enjoyment to adults and children alike.

A rare and charming work. Better known for his 1803 work with intricate hand-coloured plates after his own drawings of landscapes, *Observations on the Theory and Practice of Landscape Gardening*, Repton both wrote the several amusing essays and dialogues that comprise *Odd Whims* and furnished the drawings for the aquatint plates.

Humphry Repton (21 April 1752 - 24 March 1818) was the last great English landscape designer of the eighteenth century, often regarded as the successor to Capability Brown. He is well-known for his fine books on Architecture and Landscape Gardening - Sketches and Hints on Landscape Gardening (1794), Observations on the Theory and Practice of Landscape Gardening (1803), Designs for the Pavilion at Brighton (1808) and Fragments on the Theory and Practice of Landscape Gardening (1816). Repton sowed the seeds of the more intricate and eclectic styles of the 19th century. His Odd Whims; and Miscellanies (1804) were dedicated to William Windham, the British Whig Statesman. Some of the essays in Variety were reprinted in this collection, and in the second volume is Odd Whims, or Two at a Time; a Comedy, Written in the year 1783, which was played at Ipswich in 1804.

Only a single plate was published at the time, in Fleuron VII, and the remaining plates remained unseen until Barn Elms printed them for the first time in this edition. Despite impressing David Jones with her work, Richards never again worked with intaglio methods, going on to serve as Head of Design at Camberwell School of Art, later teaching at the Chelsea School of Art.




