In Joseph Blumenthal's "Bruce Rogers. A Life in Letters," Blumenthal describes this volume; "I believe the Bruce Rogers Odyssey is indisputably amongst the most beautiful books ever produced. It is difficult to describe a work of genius. In the Odyssey without tricks or accessory decoration, with a classic austerity akin to the timeless proportions of the Parthenon, with only type and paper and ink, with consummate skill, Rogers created a masterpiece".

Lawrence worked assiduously on this classic translation alongside his other projects between 1928 and 1931, coming up with the first edition in English which offered both "the spirit and the narrative of the Greek original in a language accessible to ordinary people" (Jeremy Wilson, "T.E. Lawrence and the translating of the Odyssey, 1928 - 1931").





Henry Lucy was a renowned satirist and parliamentary sketch writer of his age. The letter refers to Lucy's 'Memories of Eight Parliaments'. Hope's reference to Prime Minister H.H. Asquith is not merely name-dropping. Hope trained as a lawyer and barrister, being called to the Bar by the Middle Temple in 1887. He served his pupillage under the future Liberal Prime Minister H. H. Asquith, who thought him a promising barrister and who was disappointed by his decision to turn to writing.

Several years later, Marlon Brando (also with an unusual singing voice as evidenced in Guys and Dolls), fell in love with the part of Long John Silver, and the production moved forward again. Unfortunately Mr Brando suffered a personal tragedy at this time involving his children, and as a result, the production languished once more. Seven months ago, CCA dusted off the hidden gem, and, upon revisiting it, recognized its potential as an animated musical feature."

For example, Schwed's first note reads: 'Page 10, near bottom of page: I don't think the gag about Ethiopian slaves is that funny and with the climate today being what it is regarding slurring reference to a black, I wish you'd think of something better.' Despite the phraseology, jarring to the modern ear, Schwed was right. Wodehouse agreed, and in his typed response instructed Schwed to cut the following exchange for the US edition which had appeared in its UK counterpart:

'But couldn't you have told her to go and drown herself in the Serpentine?'

'How could I? She's the boss. You wouldn't expect an Ethiopian slave to tell Cleopatra to go and drown in the Nile.'


'I wouldn't have taken you for an Ethiopian slave.'

'Only because I'm a bit blonder than the average Ethiopian."

Other points picked up by Schwed include a reminder that cabs in London are black, not yellow (Wodehouse had been in the United States so long he appears to have forgotten), and that 'bird' is more likely London slang for a young woman than 'popsy' or 'doll'. On one of Schwed's notes Wodehouse is less flexible. Questioning a spelling, Schwed writes 'I don't know why Shakespeare spelled "the ravelled sleave of care" as "sleave" but I'm pretty sure he did.' Wodehouse, whose knowledge of the Bard was deep and wide, is entertainingly dismissive: 'Shakespeare couldn't even spell his own name, so I don't think we need worry about 'sleaves' and 'sleeves'.'

A fascinating exchange between an author and editor.
