First edition, limited to only 330 copies and printed on Munken Pure uncoated paper. An authoritative and well-researched and finely illustrated book on the work of the official war artist Anthony Gross during World War II.

Anthony Imre Alexander Gross CBE RA (1905-1984) was a war artist, painter, prnt maker and film director who had a long and distinguished career alongside other war artists of the period, such as Edward Bawden, Eric Ravilious, and Edward Ardizzone, but whose work is much lesser known. This monograph celebrates a talented artist who studied at various studios around Europe including at the Slade (under Henry Tonks), and at the École des Beaux Arts, and the Académie Julian, in Paris.

Eric Kennington proposed him as an official war artist to the War Artists' Advisory Committee and he was accepted, going on to operate in various theatres of war including the Egyptian, Syrian, Kurdistan, Lebanese, Palestinian, and Mesopotamian. He also accompanied the 8th Army's North African Campaign and the D-Day invasion of Northern France, and witnessed the devastation of Caen and Bayeux. Later he travelled the Allied Forces into liberated Paris, and then on to Germany.

The two authors has also swapped books, "Your book! I was quite unconscious of time and pain while I was reading it! Sherlock and Bennett's Grand Babylon Hotel was all I knew of this sort of works. I like it. Don't forget to read Les Caves du Vaitican (Gide) and Les Grandes Meulne (Alain Fournier)...I should be very happy if you could come to-day about nine o'clock in the evening. It would be whisky and soda time and you and I could talk a little about what we love and about things we hate as well."

General Sir Andrew Francis Barnard GCB GCH (1773 – 17 January 1855) was an Irish British Army officer. He served in various capacities in the West Indies, the Cape of Good Hope, Canada, the Netherlands, Sicily, Spain and in the Napoleonic Wars including the Battle of Waterloo for which service he was highly decorated. After his retirement from active duty, he served in a number of civilian positions, being promoted to general four years before his death.

Printed menu in French for the Hotel Touraine in Buffalo NY to celebrate "Centieme Representation de la Compagnie Sarah Bernhardt". Signed by Sarah Bernhardt.

Sarah Bernhardt made her first American Farewell Tour in 1905–1906, the first of four farewell tours she made to the US, Canada, and Latin America, with her new managers, the Shubert brothers. She attracted controversy and press attention when, during her 1905 visit to Montreal, the Roman Catholic bishop encouraged his followers to throw eggs at Bernhardt, because she portrayed prostitutes as sympathetic characters. The US portion of the tour was complicated due to the Shuberts' competition with the powerful syndicate of theatre owners which controlled nearly all the major theatres and opera houses in the United States. The syndicate did not allow outside producers to use their stages. As a result, in Texas and Kansas City, Bernhardt and her company performed under an enormous circus tent, seating 4,500 spectators, and in skating rinks in Atlanta, Savannah, Tampa, and other cities. Her private train took her to Knoxville, Dallas, Denver, Tampa, Chattanooga, and Salt Lake City, then on to the West Coast of the United States.

The Hotel Touraine was a nine-story Gothic Revival style hotel with four-story annex (added 1923). A unique example of the Flamboyant Gothic style in Buffalo as it was applied to a multi-story structure, built as a residential hotel. The Hotel originally had 250 rooms.

The building has a roof line 118 feet above the street; frontage on Delaware Avenue of 64 feet, and 122 feet on Johnson Park. One feature of the building was the installation of 100 bathrooms. The rooms were finished in red polished tile work with golden oak woodwork. Each room had a modern shower attachment. The tubs used were exhibited at the Pan-American Exposition and won a gold medal.

Ethelbert Blatter SJ (15 December 1877 – 26 May 1934) was a Swiss Jesuit priest and pioneering botanist in British India. Author of five books and over sixty papers on the flora of the Indian subcontinent, he was Principal and Professor of Botany at St Xavier College, Bombay and Vice-President of the Bombay Natural History Society. In 1932, he became the first recipient of the Johannes Bruehl Memorial Medal of the Asiatic Society of Bengal.

Mugby Junction is a set of short stories written in 1866 by Charles Dickens and collaborators Charles Collins, Amelia B. Edwards, Andrew Halliday, and Hesba Stretton. It was first published in a Christmas edition of the magazine *All the Year Round*. Dickens penned a majority of the issue, including the frame narrative in which "the Gentleman for Nowhere," who has spent his life cloistered in the firm Barbox Brothers & Co., makes use of his newfound freedom in retirement to explore the rail lines that connect with Mugby Junction. Dickens's collaborators each contributed an individual story to the collection. *Mugby Junction* includes the famous ghost story *The Signal-Man*.

The novel *No Thoroughfare* was first published in 1867, in the Christmas number of Dickens's periodical *All the Year Round*. There are thematic parallels with other books from Dickens's mature writings, including *Little Dorrit* (1857) and especially *Our Mutual Friend* (1865).

The Descent of Man, and Selection in Relation to Sex was first published in 1871. It applies evolutionary theory to human evolution, and details Darwin's theory of sexual selection, a form of biological adaptation distinct from, yet interconnected with, natural selection. The book discusses many related issues, including evolutionary psychology, evolutionary ethics, differences between human races, differences between sexes, the dominant role of women in mate choice, and the relevance of the evolutionary theory to society.

Fritz Kredel (1900-1973) was a German, later American artist and graphic designer. In his early years, he studied under Rudolf Koch at Offenbach School of Art and Design, and developed skills in woodcuts. Koch and Kredel collaborated on A Book of Signs (1923) and The Book of Flowers (1930). Following Koch's death in 1934, Kredel moved to Frankfurt, but in 1938 he fled Germany for political reasons with help from Melbert Cary. After emigrating to the United States that year, he taught at Cooper Union in New York and continued to work as an artist. He produced illustrations for over 400 books in German and English and received many awards and honors. Many of his originals are now housed at the Art Library at Yale University.

Henry Williamson's book Tarka the Otter is the subject of the fourth essay in the book entitled A Criticism of Henry Williamson's Tarka the Otter with Some Remarks on the Style of Doughty's Arabia Deserta. The essay was taken from a letter TEL had sent to Edward Garnett on 20th January 1928.

Inspired by reading Lawrence's Revolt in the Desert, Williamson wrote to Lawrence (via the author's publisher) enclosing part of the MSS of Tarka the Otter. Several months later, in the winter of 1927, he received a registered letter from Cape's literary editor, Edward Garnett, with another letter enclosed from Lawrence (writing as T. E. Shaw), thanking Williamson for the pages from Tarka, followed by several closely handwritten foolscap pages of equal praise and criticism.

Williamson quickly wrote a long thank you letter back to Lawrence, addressing the letter to 337181, A. C. Shaw, C/O R.A.F. Karachi. After that their correspondence grew, with each man declaring that the other was the better writer. Their friendship grew and indeed Lawrence died in a motoring accident on his return from sending a telegram to Williamson.

Robert Hay was commissioned in 1917 into the IMS and commanded a field ambulance in Mesopotamia. He served in the Arab rebellion before returning to India in 1920. In 1926 he was transferred to the foreign and political department. As chief medical officer of Baluchistan and civil surgeon of Quetta he survived the earthquake of 1935. In 1938 he was appointed deputy director general of the IMS. In 1942 he became inspector-general of civil hospitals in the Punjab and subsequently surgeon-general, Bombay. In 1945 he was appointed director general. His task from 1945 to 1947 was to prepare for the transfer of power in medicine, with separate divisions for the future India and Pakistan, and he carried out his difficult task

with efficiency, dignity, and modesty. He then held administrative appointments in the Scottish Health Service and retired in 1955. He was appointed CIE in 1942 and promoted KCIE in 1947.(British Medical Journal Obituary 31 May 1980)

Spurr & Swift of London in 1932 and was described by them as having the name of Richard E. King Ltd. as being the publisher, but no date. This book was bound in brown cloth with gilt edges. As this edition was totally unknown to the authors, it seems fair to assume that it is a pirate edition.'

The literary scholar Nevill Coghill was Edith Somerville's nephew. In his copy of the bibliography we find the following note: 'Another copy of the pirated edition is in the possession of my sister Katharine, who says it is bound in green. This is Katharine's copy, and bears her bookplate to the front pastedown.'

Richard Edward King was a notorious figure, seen variously as a hero for developing publishing into a mass market producing 'Books for the Millions' - or a villain for printing books for which he did not hold the copyright and for being an insurance fraudster arsonist. The business at the Curtain Road premises was a short-lived affair at the end of Victoria's reign.

Barnum and Bret Harte, five photographic portraits of Stanley and the officers of the Advance Command of the Expedition, a tipped-in plate of 'Shield and Medallions' and accompanying description, along with the evening's menu, music programme, and 'Toast List'. The text does not include either the eulogies on Stanley and his officers, or the guest list, both of which occur in the 12-leaf Quentin Keynes copy.

With an invitation card signed by American pharmaceutical entrepreneur Henry Wellcome admitting a 'Mr Alfred H. Mason' with the 'No. 352' at the upper left corner. Wellcome was the Honorary Secretary, who organised this banquet event. Wellcome's new tabloid medicines in the form of "nine beautiful chests replete with every medicament necessary to combat the endemic diseases peculiar to Africa" accompanied the expedition, and there were several pharmaceutical colleagues in attendance at the event.

The text includes the menu of nine courses served on May 30th, 1890 including "Babas a la Stanley" for entrements. It was a lavish event, held in the Portman Rooms, with the Band of the Grenadier Guards playing 10 songs. At this event, Stanley was presented with a massive testimonial shield and medallions wrought in fine silver by Elkington & Co. The shield was designed by Henry Wellcome,

Stanley's last expedition in Africa was for the relief of Mehmed Emin Paşha, governor of the Equatorial Province of Egypt, who had been cut off by the Mahdist revolt of 1882 in the environs of Lake Albert. Stanley was appointed to lead a relief expedition and decided to approach Lake Albert by way of the Congo River, counting on Tippu Tib to supply porters. Stanley left England in January 1887 and arrived at the mouth of the Congo in March. The expedition reached the navigable head of the river in June, and there, at Yambuya, Stanley left a rear column with orders to await Tippu Tib's porters. Eventually the expedition was assembled at Lake Albert, and, despite Emin's initial reluctance to leave his province, some 1,500 persons set out for the east coast on April 10, 1889, and arrived at Bagamoyo on December 4. On the way, the Ruwenzori Range was revealed to explorers for the first time (identified as Ptolemy's Mountains of the Moon), and the Semliki River was shown to link Lakes Edward and Albert; thus were cleared up the few doubtful geographic points regarding the Nile sources.

The book "boasted over a thousand precious and semi-precious jewels, thousands of separate leather onlays and it took the firm two years of

continuous work to finish. Enclosed in an oak slipcase, the Rubaiyat's ornate cover of Moroccan leather inlaid with a depiction of three peacocks, their tail feathers spread dramatically, including gold embroidery in the details, as well as a Persian ud, similar to a lute, designed of inlaid wood and ivory. The small and delicate jewels which encrusted the book's binding included more than 1,000 emeralds, rubies, amethysts, and topazes, each set separately in gold."

For many years he wrote articles on these subjects for several newspapers, principally for Country Life, a paper in which he had taken greatest interest since its foundation. He also wrote a number of novels, the best known of which are perhaps "Peter Steele, the Cricketer" and "Bert Edward, the Golf Caddie." Towards the end of his life he also essayed with success the form of the detective story, to which he gave a characteristic touch of distinction. But he was at his best as an essayist on the many subjects—sport, Nature, dreams, folk-lore—that interested him; his wide acquaintance with men and subjects made him an excellent choice as the biographer of the first Lord Avebury; and the more intimate side of his character is seen in "Records of a Human Soul" and in "From Doubt to Faith."". (Times Obituary Friday 29th July, 1932).

"Wallace's most famous achievement was his independent discovery of the principle of natural selection as a key to the method of evolution. "Wallace summed up his work on biology in 1910 with his *World of Life*, in which he accepted the chromosome theory of inheritance and Galton's numerical law of inheritance. Numerical phytogeography and zoogeography also are stressed, and the continuing influence of Spiritualism is evident. This was his last extensive work on scientific matters" (DSB).

Born Alfred Hardy, he assumed by Royal licence the additional surname of Gathorne in 1878 like the rest of his family. The same year he was elected to the House of Commons for Canterbury, a seat he held until 1880, when the constituency was suspended. He returned to Parliament in 1886 when he was returned for East Grinstead, and continued to represent this constituency until 1895.

An observant naturalist he was also a keen shot and fisherman. In 1900 Longmans published his "Autumns in Argyle with Rod and Gun", which is a collection of reminiscences of 30 years worth of sporting visits to his brother-in-law's estate at Poltalloch in Argyll.

Alfred's nephew, George Goschen, to whom he gave this book, died in the First World War, having been mentioned in dispatches for gallantry.
