

A portfolio of 90 ring designs, all depicted in actual size. Drawings in pencil and watercolour on various coloured cards, inserted at corners into album leaves, separated by patterned glassine tissue guards.

Oblong 8vo., bound in contemporary patterned boards, string tie. '252/2' stamped to front pastedown. Slight rubbing to board extremities, a touch of wear to spine tail, tie ends a little frayed, internally clean and bright, a very good example of a unique item.

The ring designs are stylistically similar, probably from the 1930s through to 1950s, with many variations of stone settings and signet rings and some with a distinctly Art Deco quality. The album was possibly a compilation of designs, either put together by a jeweller or workshop, or by a collector, rather than a presentation album for prospective clients. Several of the intricate drawings have pencil annotations (possibly Eastern European in origin?), the numerical annotations likely referring to either size or price.





ORIGINAL BALLET SET DESIGN

8. **BEATON, Cecil.** [Set design for Frederick Ashton's ballet 'Picnic at Tintagel'.]

Mounted 20 x 14 inch grey board with original backdrop design by Cecil Beaton in watercolour, chalk and crayon, signed "Picnic at Tintagel = Beaton" in bottom right hand corner.

An evocative coastal scene in green and grey with pastel blue sky.

A little abrasion to the edges of the image where the piece had presumably been taped up for use by the crew working on the backdrop itself.

English photographer and designer Cecil Beaton (1904–1980) made his Royal Ballet debut in 1936 designing Frederick Ashton's Apparitions for the then Vic-Wells Ballet. He returned to design Ashton's Les Sirènes and Marguerite and Armand for The Royal Ballet and Turandot for The Royal Opera (originally produced by the Metropolitan Opera, New York). Beaton's other collaborations with Ashton included Illuminations and Picnic at Tintagel for New York


City Ballet and The Nutcracker for Sadler's Wells Theatre Ballet (later Birmingham Royal Ballet).

Frederick Ashton's Picnic at Tintagel is inspired by Mary Elizabeth Braddon's popular Victorian novel Royal Mount in which sightseers picnic on the ruins of Tintagel Castle, Cornwall.

Ashton retells the story of Tristan and Isolde in two time frames, one Edwardian and the other set in the Dark Ages. As the story opens the Edwardians are picnicking amidst Tintagel's ruins where the lovers wander off for a tryst. The narrative then shifts to the Celtic lovers and their deaths at the hand of King Mark, Iseult's fiancé. Recovering from the impact of this tragedy, Ashton slyly rescues his Edwardians from discovery and the wrath of a cuckolded husband. All are frustrated but no one dies.

Stage settings and costumes are by Cecil Beaton. Ashton chose Arnold Bax's The Garden at Fand instead of his tone poem Tintagel. George Balanchine commissioned the ballet, which was first performed by the New York City Ballet in February 1952.





The complete autograph manuscript draft of the spoken commentary for Betjeman's television programme "One Man's County".

Two pages numbered 3 contain two drafts of the description of Cornwall's boulder-strewn landscape and the coming of man and pages 9-10 contain two drafts of the passage on chimneys and mine shafts. There are numerous changes between this manuscript and the text printed in Betjeman's Cornwall, including three substantial passages that must have been omitted when the film was cut including material on tin mines and old houses; a description of the old cobbled village of St. Day and thoughts on tourism. The programme was broadcast on BBC1 in 1964. Betjeman loved Cornwall from childhood holidays and revisited it to the end of his days. His contribution to the Cornwall volume of the Shell English county guides is the most notable in the series. Betjeman is buried at St. Enodoc's Church, Trebetherick.



A masquerade at Ranelagh Gardens, Chelsea. In the background is the Rotunda, designed by William Jones, architect of the East India Company, and built in 1741.

The woman in the centre foreground, standing between a friar and the clown Pantaloon, is apparently Elizabeth Chudleigh. In 1749 she caused a sensation by appearing at a masquerade at Ranelagh dressed as the sacrificial victim Iphigenia, in an outfit with a see-through top. Elizabeth Montagu, who had gone as Queen Henrietta Maria, remarked, "Miss Chudleigh's dress, or rather undress, was remarkable; she was Iphigenia for the sacrifice, but so naked the high priest might easily inspect the entrails of the victim". With the 1983 ownership signature of John L.B. Garcia - author of 'Harold Hilton His Golfing Life and Times' (1992) - to the front free endpaper.

Clark, an Edinburgh printer and avid if not expert golfer, was the first to record and preserve much of the early documentation and literature of the game. His book is thus perhaps the most significant early book on the history of golf. His compilation of extracts from a variety of sources includes the minute books of the R&A and Honourable Company of Edinburgh Golfers, 15th century royal proclamations, burgh and parish records, and poetry, including a full reprint of 'The Goff' of 1743. Also biographies of Allan Robertson and Tom Morris Jnr.

According to the doyen of golf book collectors, Joseph Murdoch: "In the eyes of some collectors, including my own, the finest book on golf". The first trade edition was published in 1875; a limited edition large paper issue of 50, which included an unknown number of presentation copies for Clark, came out the following year. The third edition of Clark's lifetime appeared in 1899.





Uncoloured wood-engraved panoramic view of the North bank of the Thames, printed on on six conjoined sheets and folding concertina-style into the publisher's blindstamped cloth boards (oblong 8vo.). The title printed in red and mounted on to the front pastedown, and repeated over a blocked vignette of St Paul's Cathedral in gilt to upper board.

Binding stained and soiled, the spine sunfaded. One prominent 'rust spot' penetrating upper cover and with decreasing traces through the first four leaves. Otherwise a good sharp impression free of significant staining save vertical lines of discolouration where sheets fold and join. Sheet 150 x 4860 mm fully extended.

Buildings and points of interest are captioned in letterpress along the lower margin. Showing the heavy river traffic of the mid-19th century metropolis and - from West to East - Westminster, Hungerford, Waterloo, Blackfriars, Southwark and London bridges.




"This is a book you won't like," John Fowles told Tom Maschler, presenting him with the manuscript at Jonathan Cape. "How wrong he was," recalled Maschler. "The French Lieutenant's Woman was simply the most magnificent piece of storytelling I had read for many years... I telephoned John immediately to express my admiration, and even in this first call I could not resist saying that the book would make a superb film. Nor could I help putting down the film of The Magus."

Guy Green's 1968 film of The Magus was decried by its star Michael Caine and by Fowles, who wrote the screenplay, as "a disaster". Maschler published The French Lieutenant's Woman at Cape in 1969, and took it upon himself to find the right director and screenwriter for a book that others (e.g. Robert Bolt) had told Fowles was "unfilmable". Maschler relates in his memoir the complications of the task and its painfully slow timetable. Harold Pinter wrote the script, Karel Reisz directed the film, and Tom Maschler was Associate Producer. Meryl Streep, exceptionally supportive of the project, played Sarah Woodruff/Anna, and

Jeremy Irons Charles Henry Smithson/Mike. The film was released to acclaim on 18 September 1981, garnering five Oscar nominations (including for Pinter, Streep and Assheton Gorton); three BAFTA awards (for Best Actress, Streep; Anthony Asquith Award for Film Music, Carl Davis; and Best Sound) and eight other nominations (including for Pinter, Reisz, Irons, Gorton, Leon Clore and Freddie Francis); a Golden Globe award (for Best Actress, Streep) and two nominations (for Pinter and Clore); the Evening Standard British Film Award for Best Film (Reisz) and a David di Donatello award for Best Screenplay for Foreign Film (Pinter). The film also won the author's approval: it was, he said, "a brilliant metaphor" for his book.

The recipient of this copy Reg Gadney, himself a novelist and sometime screenwriter, was the second husband of Tom Maschler's first wife, Fay Maschler



Heywood Hill Spring 2020 Rare@heywoodhill.com England were sent to D. Appleton & Company in New York to be used for the first American edition of 1866. Thus this leaf from the Appleton issue represents the earliest printing of Alice's Adventures in Wonderland.

Hall was an Edinburgh-born captain in the Royal Navy. He travelled from Boston down the eastern seaboard of the USA, to Charleston and Savannah, west to Louisiana, thence up the Mississippi to St. Louis, Missouri; from there he headed north east through Illinois, Indiana, Ohio and Pennsylvania, and along the Erie Canal through New York, pressing on into Canada, to Quebec and Montreal. He drew the views and characters he encountered en route with the aid of a camera lucida - an optical device invented by William Hyde Wollaston in 1807 that allowed the artist to draw an image in true perspective. The author gives an interesting commentary on the advantages of this technology in his Memorandum.

The enigmatic etchings include very early views of Buffalo, Rochester, Peterborough, Riceborough, Columbus and New Orleans. Also featured are Niagara Falls, views on the Erie Canal, riverboats, a stagecoach as well as plenty of human interest, in the form of Native Americans, backwoodsmen, and black African slave drivers. One plate depicts three 'Canadian Voyageurs of Captain Franklin's Canoe', an encounter presumably with the celebrated explorer Sir John Franklin RN (1786–1847) returning from the Canadian arctic.

Hall is critical of American customs. Lizars' most celebrated engravings must be the first ten plates for J.J. Audubon's double elephant folio 'Birds of America'.


Sir John Hill (1714-1775) was apparently from Peterborough. He was trained as an apothecary and set up a small shop in St. Martin's Lane. He travelled all over the country in search of rare herbs in order to write a herbal but this took longer than he thought. He was a prolific writer, his first publication being a translation of Theophrastuss History of Stones (1746). He edited the British Magazine (1746-1750), and for two years (1751-1753) he wrote a daily letter, The Inspector, for the London Advertiser and Literary Gazette. He also produced novels, plays and scientific works, and was a large contributor to the supplement of Ephraim Chambers's Cyciopaedia. His personal and scurrilous writings made him many

enemies, including Henry Fielding, Christopher Smart and David Garrick all of whom attacked him in print.

The Dictionary of National Biography attribute 76 different works the Hill but his most important are his botanical works. In addition Hannah Glasse's famous manual of cookery was generally ascribed to him (see Boswell, ed. Hill, iii. 285) as it was not readily believed that a woman could have written it. Dr Johnson said of him that he was an ingenious man, but had no veracity. The British Herbal, however, is a work of veracity and vitally important for modern botanical nomenclature in that not only did Hill attempt to name and categorize the flowers and herbs which grow in Britain but he classifed them on the forms of the corolla and gynoecium and criticised the Linnaean system.

This is the famous Oxford botanist George Druce's copy who later praised Hill for his criticisms of Linnaeus.

The image shows a flapper in evening gown. Flapper Filosofy was a newspaper comic panel distributed by King Features Syndicate and the O'Dell Newspaper Service. It ran during the flapper era, from 1929 to 1935. The art was by Faith Burrows.

Each panel exhibited a flapper wearing one of the current fashions, with a witticism typed at the bottom. Burrows drew her panels at an image size of $3" \times 6"$ on Bristol boards measuring $3\frac{1}{2}" \times 6\frac{1}{2}"$.

Burrows' series ran in competition for a time with Ethel Hays' similarly themed and well-established Flapper Fanny Says panel from NEA. As writers such as F. Scott Fitzgerald and Anita Loos, and illustrators such as Burrows, Hays, Russell Patterson and John Held Jr. popularized the flapper look and lifestyle through their works, flappers came to be seen as attractive, reckless and independent.

That Ronald Knox should show a wry sense of humour is not surprising. His brother E. V. Knox was the editor of the humorous magazine Punch. What is particularly pleasing is to see Knox's humour expressed in the context of the vestments of the profession he was about to enter.





She founded the Society of Herbalists, a non-profit organisation, for the study and application of herbalism in 1927. She was also an early campaigner against synthetic fertilizers.



A pair of doves to the left, with an infant Cupid upper right and horses and dolphins in the water behind; the whole in an oval. According to Greek mythology, Aphrodite was born as an adult woman from the sea.

Barry, a history and portrait painter and printmaker of Irish origin, exhibited his painting of Venus Anadyomene at the Royal Academy in 1772 as 'Venus Rising from the Sea'. It was to become his most reproduced work.

George Finch, 9th Earl of Winchilsea was a founding member of the MCC and alongside John Bligh, 4th Earl of Darnley, an important aristocratic patron of 18th century cricket. Winchilsea's MCC team with three Hambledon players "given" beat Darnley's Kent side by

10 wickets. It is curious that two-stump wickets are depicted as the third stump was provided for in the 1785 edition of the Laws.

One of the two figures sitting on the bench in the foreground with his back to the viewer is evidently the MCC's first scorer, Samuel Britcher. Britcher compiled the first 'cricket annual' in 1790.

(who was famously satirised in Rowlandson's 'Dr. Syntax' adventures). Several albums of Sawrey's sketches of horses, dogs and wild animals are in the Paul Mellon collection.

On the dog's collar is a plaque lettered Thos. Thornton Esqr. The larger-then-life Yorkshire sportsman Thomas Thornton (1757-1823) was a major patron of Gilpin's, for whom the artist also painted a favourite foxhound, 'Modish'. This was also reproduced, as a companion to the present print.

This print is based upon an 1874 watercolour of the same title which the artist exhibited at the Exposition Universelle, Paris in 1878.





The majority of the plates are after Luke Clennell (1781-1840), Northumberland-born wood engraver and painter, one of Bewick's most notable pupils.






